The Centre has frozen accounts of 30 NGOs following allegations of misuse of for-eign funds and banned 70 other voleign funds and banned 70 other vol-mutary organizations from receiving donations from abroad. The question that is now being posed is that wheth-er such protests are limited only to nuclear projects or is there a wider ramification and a more grandiose plan to slow down the Indian econo-

Besides tarnishing the reputation of India abroad and creating doubts within, the recent round of NGO protests have led to a delay in the project work and has already led to a loss of around 900 crores of rupees, according to conservative estimates. to conservative estimates

According to the Russian ambassador, Alexander M Kadakin, India would be losing around \$1 million a would be losing around \$1 million a day for the delay. If every power project is targeted in this way, it becomes clear that India will have to bear cost over-runs to the tune of thousands of crores of rupees besides slowing down India's economic growth.
